1.1 INTRODUCTION

The HNSB. Ltd. Science College is promoted and managed by the Himatnagar Kelavani Mandal it was founded in 1993. Himatnagar Kelavani Mandal was started with unique vision to build a brilliant generation next. As of today, the Mandal has grown in size and spread into three branches of School, PTC college, Law college, Pharmacy college, Arts and Commerce college, BBA college and Science college from where more than 5000 students gain quality education. The H.N.S.B. Ltd Science College was the first institution to be set up in 1993 in the Himatnagar city. Today, it is one of the youngest and premier Science College of the Sabarkantha district. College is approved by the Government of Gujarat and is affiliated to the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University, Patan to conduct job oriented UG & PG Programmes. It offers 03 under graduate and 02 post graduate programmes in the Chemistry, Microbiology and Botany subjects. The campus is spread in about 22.27acres. The institution has around 1100 students taking best quality education and excels in their disciplines.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The HNSB Ltd Science College is affiliated to Hemchandra Acharya North Gujarat University, Patan. The curriculum of all the courses is designed by the BOS and the same is executed at college level. The college offers three UG programmes, two PG programmes and Ph.D. facility in four departments. For effective curriculum delivery and quality education, the academic calendar, which consists of curricular, co curricular and extracurricular activities, is generally followed. The college has introduced 14 certificate and value added courses in the last five years. Choice Based Credit System, subjective elective and generic courses helped the institution in providing academic flexibility to the students. Botany programme was introduced from 2017-2018. Internship, field projects, training, project work, problem solving, seminar and industrial visits also receive emphasis in dealing with the curricular aspects.

The institute collects feedback from different stakeholders and the outcome of feedback is implemented to enhance academic and administrative system.

The College in keeping with the vision frames its programmes that are developed with relevance to local,

regional, national and global needs so as to make students employable and to meet the current requirements of the industry.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-Learning Process:

All the departments of the institute synchronize their teaching learning curriculum as per the academic calendar issues by the institute. Teaching-Learning process is effectively implemented by our well qualified faculties. Average percentage of full time teachers with Ph.D. is about 72%. Our two faculties Dr. S. S. Andher and Dr. M. N. Parmar are GPSC qualified and one faculty Ms Sejal Jadav is NET qualified. All faculties are busy to serve at best level teaching to the learners to achieve academic excellence and hence in the academic year 2018-19, our two students are awarded by GOLD medals from HNGU. The ICT methodologies are adopted by the faculties to make teaching learning process more effective and inventive. The teaching learning process is being student centric. Academic flexibility is achieved by offering various elective during curriculum and industry is achieved by conducting certificate courses, value added courses, class seminars, project work, problem solving, and hands on training, internship, quiz, guest lectures, industrial visits and assignment methods.

Evaluation Process:

The institute adheres to the academic calendar. Continuous internal evaluation is being implemented by the institute from the academic year 2018-2019 in the UG. Mechanism of internal evaluation is transparent and effective in terms of frequency and variety. Robustness and transparency are observed in the ESE. The college results have always been higher than the university results.

The college has designed the COs, POs and PSOs and hosted in the display boards and website.

Research, Innovations and Extension

All the faculties and students are motivated and promoted for research attitude and for extension activities.

Faculty Contribution:

At present, 11 faculty members are working as research guides for Ph.D. students, and 7 research scholars who successfully got Ph.D. degree under the guidance of our faculty members in the last five years. Publication of research work has resulted in appearance of over 91 research papers in different journal of the national and international reputed. 27 books are published at national and international level. One state level and one national level seminar are organized by chemistry and library department for promoting research and innovation activities. One patent is filed by Dr Z. M. Gadhawala in the subject of chemistry. At present 27 research papers are presented at international level, 60 are presented at national level and 44 research papers are presented at state level seminars/conferences by the faculty members.

Student's Contribution:

Our PG department promotes innovation activity among PG students through project work programme. Under

the programme student work in groups, prepare and project their research work in the state, national and international conferences as well as in research journals and got awards. At present 04 students have presented their research work and posters at international level, 66 have presented at national level, 81 have presented at state level and 48 students have presented at regional level seminar and conferences.

Extension Activities:

The extension activities cover native, social and universal issues and conducted through NSS and various committees. The institute has shown its keep interest in signing MOUs, linkages and collaboration with industries, NGOs and educational institutes for promoting training, internship, placement, outreach programmes and extension activities. Program like Swatch Bharat, Sapling plantation, Blood donation, Thalasemmia camp, Activities in slum area, Gender equity, Universal values and ethics, donation to blinds, arm forced flag and victims of natural calamities are done by NSS and other committees of the institution.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructure:

Our institute has total 22.27 acres campus and total built up area is 3533.82 sq.mts. The college has 07 well equipped classrooms, 08 laboratories, 05 classrooms with LCD projectors, NSS room, ladies room, rest room, canteen, botanical garden, and ladies hostel.

During last five years, there has been continuous augmentation of physical infrastructure. The institute has provided the facility of ladies hostel. The second floor of the college is enhanced with 2 more rooms and 01 laboratory. The 2nd floor of the college is enhanced with 2 halls with 250 seating capacity o to meet the need of academic growth. For the development of the infrastructure approx Rs. 68.00 lakhs has been utilized by the management.

The institute has good indoor and outdoor sports facilities with cricket, volleyball, badminton, athletics track and yoga.

Learning Resources:

The college is enabled with internet connectivity with 10 Mbps.

The college has DELL laboratory with 26 computers and with internet facility for students and faculties

The college library is automated with SOUL, 2.0 version software. It has an outstanding resource with a stock of 5547 reference books, 08 research journals, 319 CDs and N-list etc.

The college has biometric and CCTV system for monitoring attendance and surveillance.

Student Support and Progression

The college has healthy environment and supportive resources for student support and progression. Students support activities mainly classified into different categories. Like,

Academic:

CBCS, bridge courses, internships, and project work, research activities, and field projects, trainings, SCOPE examination are arranged by the department to bridge the gap between academic site and industry. Students benefits by career counselling and by the guidance of competitive exams during the last five years. Students have won awards and medals for outstanding performance in academic during last five years.

Career Guidance:

Career guidance seminars, workshop and competitive exam seminars are arranged by the career guidance cells which give positively support to students regarding the career opportunity. Total 15 students are qualified in different state and central government examinations in the last five years.

Placement:

Placement cell (UDISHA) maintains strong Industry- Institute relationship and provides support to students for placement. 18 students have been placed in different industries and institutions in the last five years by the UDISHA.

Cultural, Sports, NSS and Outreach Programmes:

Large number of students not only participated in cultural, sports, NSS, and outreach activities but they also shine out by achieving awards, prizes, championships and ranks at different level.

09 students have won awards and championships in sports and culture activities in the last five years.

Financial Aids:

Students receive financial assistance in the form of scholarship and free ships from the state and central government. Approx 1281 students are benefitted by scholarships provided by the governments during last five years and are approx 67.57 lakhs.

Alumni:

The institute has alumni association. At present 1157 students are registered as alumni in the college. The alumni of the college played a vital role in the development of the college by their financial and non financial contributions.

Student Council:

SC is also established at college level which acts as a supporting agency between students and administration.

The institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including feedback, sexual harassment and ragging cases. Our campus is totally ragging free campus since last 26 years.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institute has well defined vision, mission, governance policies, leadership and strategies to shine out academic excellence. Between the employees, students and management, principal and IQAC play a visit role in planning and implementing all the activities. They play a leadership role in the effective implementation of the teaching learning and students support activities. The governance and leadership plan is divided at six levels.

At all levels respected persons carries his leadership responsibility honestly. The institute has student council. It has student leaders with various responsibilities and works in co ordination with the council's convener. The leadership in students is promoted in the conduction of various activities though this council.

The IQAC contributes significantly and plays a catalytic role for institutionalizing the quality assurance, strategies and process during whole year. The college accounts are audited by the private charted accountant.

Problem solving: Students of UG and PG are given problem solving as a part of curriculum activity on different topics related to subject.

Feed back: End of the year feedback of students, parents and alumni are collected and submitted to committee.

Cross cutting issues: As part of the curriculum, cross cutting issues like Gender sensitization, Environment and sustainability, Professional ethics and Human value are covered.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Response:

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

University Reforms:

The evaluation of the students has become an internal as well as integral part of the teaching learning process. The semester examinations of first year are conducted in the institution on behalf of the university as unit test from 2018-19 as a part of CIE. While in the second and third year semester general pattern examinations are conducted. Answer papers are evaluated at the college level by the subject experts. The results of the examinations are prepared and sent online in prescribed time and format to the university.

Institutional Reforms:

Like university reforms, the institution also has followed some reforms in internal college evaluation system. In the academic year 2011-12, the University introduced semester system with CBCS pattern for all F.Y. and M.Sc. sem 1 classes. Later on it was gradually implemented to the senior classes one after other. By 2013-14, this system of education with CBCS pattern was fully implemented at all levels of graduation in science faculty. As it is a 70:30 pattern of university and college internal examination, the college has to hold examination and get evaluation done of 30% of the whole paper. Out of these 30 marks, the college holds traditional examination for 20 marks. The other 10 marks are allotted to assignments and attendance etc.

This is strictly observed that the evaluation work is to be completed within stipulated time and the statement of marks is submitted to the university within time. The college constitutes examination committee of senior teachers for conducting end semester examination. The college examination committee adheres to the guidelines and strictly follows the instructions of the university. The faculties are assigned invigilation duties. The examination committee works as internal squad committee and it takes care about copy free atmosphere in the college. The internal assessment marks are submitted to the university. The committee maintains one copy of the same with them.

For the students, the institution displays all the circulars regarding examinations on notice boards from time to time. From the very beginning of the academic year, the entire process of evaluation is systematically planned and presented before the students.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

Examination is always an important scale to measure the potential of a students. An affiliated institute is supposed to abide by the rules of examination set by the university. As per the examination system of our Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University, Patan, The evaluation of students at any level in Bachelor of Science is done on 30:70 schemes. 30% weightage of the result is given to internal exams. This examination is held once in every semester. The students are supposed to appear for university exam for the remaining 70% of marks. The mechanism of examination has to be very transparent and robust. The internal assessment of examinations is the mirror of the success of teaching. This helps in upgrading the graph of student academic success. End semester examinations are conducted by the institution.

The planning of the approximate dates of examination is declared to the faculties and students during the initial month of the semester through academic calendar. On the instructions of the Principal and examination committee, the HODs of different departments, distributes responsibility of drawing question papers to their respective faculties. This process is kept confidential not only from the students but also from other faculty members as well. Even the faculties submit their papers in sealed covers which are directly submitted to examination convener and then after proceeds for printing. The college has a regular committee for the internal assessment. The committee consists of senior teachers. It plans its programme and conveys it to the students in advance. The students know the timetable and they also know the nature of the tests.

The examinations are conducted in a very healthy atmosphere. The chart of invigilators circulates to the staff one day before examination. The faculties of the college perform the duty of invigilators. Examination committee, consisting of senior faculty members, performs the duty of both senior supervisor and local squad to control malpractices. All the classes and lobbies are always under surveillance of the watchful eyes of CCTV cameras. There are rare cases of malpractice during examination. The faculties submit the results after assessment within a time given by examination committee around 15 days. The internal result sheets are displayed on the notice boards for the students. The evaluation of the internal test papers and assignments/ unit tests/ seminars etc. is done so objectively that there are rare cases of grievances regarding evaluation within the institution. The students who have unable to appear in the regular internal examination due to some valid reasons like doctor advice for bed rest, attend interview, exam and marriage etc get chance for retest. Once the marks are put on the notice board, students are given stipulated time of ten days, if they have any query about assessment in the respective subjects. There is a transparent mechanism of reassessment of the answer sheet on demand. We invite applications about their queries and show them their answer books to resolve their queries.

The following mechanism is adopted to deal with the examination related grievances.

The exam related grievances of the students are always given priority in the college as well as university.

Redressal of grievances at institute level:

College level

At college level, as far as the grievances related to internal evaluation are concerned, students can approach the convener of examination committee who attend to the problem and reach a solution.

Once the marks are put on the notice board, students are given stipulated time of ten days, if they have any query about the assessment in the respective subjects.

There is a transparent mechanism of reassessment of the answer sheet on demand. We invite applications about their queries and show them their answer books to resolve their queries.

University level

Students who have any grievance related to the university examinations, they approach examination section of the Hemchandracharya North Gujarat University and file their application for the same through college.

Their applications are paid proper attention and are answered within a stipulated time.

If the students have grievances related to results of their university exam, they have to fill up a form within 15 days of declaration of the result with fixed fee. Their applications are worked upon by a special cell with Examination Controller as the leader of the cell. If the student belongs to final year of degree exam, he can apply for rechecking or reassessment of his answer sheet.

A student belonging to semester I to IV gets the facility of rechecking only. This grievance redressal is done in quite a transparent manner.

If the result of reassessment differs from the original one by more than 15%, the effect of difference is sanctioned to the student.

Moreover, the students who are caught by the invigilator or university squad for control of malpractices in

examination are given a chance to present their case before the *Pariksha Shuddhi Samiti* of the university within 15 days. The committee neutrally decides the level of the students' malpractice and declares the punishment accordingly.

The institute furnishes infrastructure facilities to fulfill the requirements of the students. Our institute aims is, creating an environment of excellence in education through technologically advanced pedagogical tools. The facilities are as under:

The college building is spread in two stores.

The ground floor consists of administrative block, NAAC room, seminar hall, girls room, library, chemistry store room, UG and PG chemistry laboratories, etc.

The college has partially automated library with 8,139 books in total, 5266 titles and other reading material such as encyclopedias, bound volumes etc. The College has an extra reading room close to the library. The college has provided **N-List facility** for teachers. They use this facility for their research or for studies. The college has purchased **SOUL** software from **INFLIBNET** for library. OPAC system is also made available in the library.

The College has 49 computers, 06 LCD Projectors, 02 OHP projectors, speakers, sound system, and audio visual aids, microphones, 01scanner, 02 scanners with printer, 12 printers, 01 Xerox machines, pen drives, UPS, USB, web camera, digital camera and 35 CCTV cameras.

The College has a separate NSS room, rest room, ladies' room, canteen and DELL lab.

The college has BSNL VPN 5 connection having speed of 10 mbps. Each department is connected with internet connection. Besides the college has regular BSNL broad band with 6 connections.

The authorities have got 01units of RO Plant installed in the college. It provides purified drinking water to students and staff.

The college has podiums, chairs, writing desk, black board marker pen etc.

The College Management has arranged to install 35 CCTV systems in the entire college

The College authorities provided 14 fire extinguishers installed in the building in 2017-18.

Response:

The Governing body takes direct initiative in the maintenance and keep of infrastructure and support facilities in consultation with the Principal. The Principal and the hired agency monitor the quality of maintenance of infrastructure and equipments. The custodians of the equipments frequently examine them for timely maintenance and repairs to ensure performance and accuracy.

Maintenance and utilization of Laboratory

The college has seven labs for students of Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Microbiology subjects. The lab equipments and facilities are strictly taken care of by the faculty. The management and college bears the maintenance expenses in the lab. The instruments in the laboratories are to be used under the supervision of the teachers. Facilities and requirements are regularly checked and maintained with the help of technical person. Department wise stock register is maintained by the laboratory assistant and annual stock verification is done with the help of HOD.

Maintenance and utilization of Class Rooms:

The Principal, the IQAC and faculties of discipline committee oversee the maintenance of the classroom equipments. Senior students in the classes take care of preserving facilities in the college intact. The college building is lent to the external agencies and Government for exams on request.

Maintenance and utilization of Computers

Though college have a duly appointed system administrator to oversee the maintenance of the computer systems. Sun Info -Tech who looks after the maintenance and updating of operative system, antivirus, software, hardware as well as technical problems of computer systems in the college.LAN and internet connectivity is regularly checked by the technician.

Maintenance and utilization of Sports amenities

All Sports amenities are under the in charge of the Director of Physical Education. A room is kept aside for keeping sports utilities. All sports amenities are utilized and maintained by the sport teacher and students. The maintenance of the courts and ground is done properly in time. Response:

• Proper waste management system is intended to reduce adverse effect on health and environment. The college looks after various options to reduce the production of different type of waste. The college authorities with the support of NSS accomplish the mission of reducing of waste material in the campus. The methods adopted by the institution to handle waste material graded as follow:

Solid Waste:

• Paper scrapes, file scrapes, glass bottle and plastic bottle scrapes, solid chemicals, glassware in the chemistry laboratory, waste plant materials in the Botany lab, various type of media in the microbiology laboratory.

Waste Management:

- Separate dustbin is kept in the all flores for collection of solid waste. Solid waste is collected and handed over by sweeper.
- News papers, magazine, paper scrapes, plastic and glass bottles are collected and ask scrap material collection person and sold for recycling purpose
- In order to vision of e-learning and to reduce the waste of papers, the departments have started providing the materials through e-content blog on the college website.
- Disposal of plastics materials is not allowed in the college premises. Banned of plastic carry bags in campus, preserve the campus as plastic free campus.
- In the chemistry laboratory the solid waste materials is collected through chemical waste pail, regular garbage, broken glass tote etc, and solid chemical waste disposed carefully into appropriate site, so that it should not have chance of any of danger for the environment.
- In the microbiology laboratory, adopted standard waste management system which include waste segregation followed by waste sterilization and if required them irichation.

Liquid Waste:

Waste:

• Rain water, drinking water, chemicals and stain reagents in the microbiology laboratory.

Waste Management:

- The college has big size underground water tank for rainwater storage which is useful in the chemistry laboratory during whole year.
- The wastage of water from drinking water plant is connected in botanical garden.
- In the Chemistry and Microbiology laboratory, the disposal of liquid waste is done carefully at proper site.
- Exhaust fans are installed in the laboratories. Waste chemicals in the laboratories are properly disposed by dissolving them in water or by keeping them in the protected zones; the different sectors of the institution promote conservation of natural resources by implementing different strategies with reference to utilization of water and energy.
- The wasted water from the washrooms is disposed off through underground sewer.

e-Waste:

• Waste: Spare parts of computer and electronics items.

e-Waste Management:

- The e-waste like spare parts of computers and electronics items are being stored properly at appropriate places. Some of the old computers are repaired and reused. Some of the unrepaired spoiled computers and electronic items are assembled in the store room.

• In the chemistry laboratory, during practical session accident occurs frequently due to use of harmful chemicals, practical and students injured, also it creates pollution and damage sustainability. So, this type of initiative creates awareness for environment among students and faculties.

The practices:

- Students are encouraged to present posters in the State/National/International level conferences on Green chemistry subject.
- To create awareness among student's community, Eco-club has arranged poster competition on save environment at college level.
- Various type of project work is given to PG students on environmental benign synthesis.
- Awareness is created among students about green methods which are useful in organic and inorganic qualitative analysis.
- E-content is developed by the faculties for students use.

Evidence of success:

- More than 92 students and faculties have presented posters on Green Chemistry topics at different level seminars.
- More than 75 students have completed their project work on environmental benign synthesis and reduce waste, save money, time and environment and also save energy.
- 13 students have presented posters on "Save Environment" topics at college level under the guidance of eco-club.
- Students are motivated for Eco-friendly methods which are useful on organic and inorganic qualitative analysis.
- One state level seminar is organized by the chemistry department on "RECENT GREEN TRANDS IN CHEMICAL SCIENCES" in 2015-2016. Total 17 posters are presented on Green chemistry subjects.
- One of our PG student Mr. Arun Malaviya won award in the state level seminar on Eco friendly synthesis of Schiff base using natural acid catalysts, Mr. Kuldeep Chauhan won third prize in the

state level seminar and 05 students of B.Sc won 1st and 3rd prize at regional level seminar.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- The institution has no authority for changing of practical syllabus
- No availability of green technologies at college level, so, more funds require for green chemistry practical at college level.

Best Practice : 2

Field Project on Microbiological Water Analysis of Moti vahorwad:

Goal:

- To create awareness among students and society about diseases obtain due to contaminated drinking water.
- To aware authorities about contaminated drinking water supplied by the Nagarpalika.

The Context:

• Motivahorad area is situated in the Himatnagar. In the month of September to October number of cases of Diarrhea, Vomiting, Dengue and Typhoid were observed in each house of the area. The complaint of the people was that the potable water supplied by the Nagarpalika is very dirty and cannot use for drinking purpose. So, to know the reasons of this problem, we have started project of Microbiological water analysis.

The practices:

• Water is collected from Moti vahorwad area of Himatnagar in sterile screw cap water bottle, after that perform SPC for quantitative analysis and MPN for qualitative analysis of water. We have also performed MTF for confirmation of fecal contamination. Based on data analysis of those three test, we have prepared water analysis report.

Evidence of Success:

- We found that dirty water supplied was used in this particular area and this water may be responsible for particular diseases.
- Our study suggests that there was interested bacterial contamination of water from the source and points of use, which was the one reason in our study.

Problems Encountered and Resources required:

Less support of society members and less interest of students is a little problem for this project.
